The Lima Presbyterian Church Elevator Speech

Like me, you love this church. We all want our church to have a future as vibrant as its present. Your session (now technically called the church 'council') has been writing personal stories about their experience of the church. These, when shared with others, will give people a sense of what we are about. Spreading the word (and the Word) is important because the long-term future of LPC will be in the care of a new group of the faithful not yet in the pews.

Who are these new people? Where will they come from? Experience suggests that you already know them. They are your neighbors, co-workers, relatives, and friends. How do you tell one of these people about LPC in a way that is interesting, informative and inviting? One way is by crafting an "elevator speech."

An "elevator speech" is an under 30 second pitch that can be delivered between the ground and fourth floors, or while in a checkout line, or during a time-out at the game. What follows is a numbered outline of an elevator speech about LPC. Some things I include in my personal speech are in italics. Yours will differ.

Background (not necessary to include)

"People are itchy and lost and bored and quick to jump at any fix. Why is there such a vast self-help industry in this country? Why do all these selves need help? They have been deprived of something by our psychological culture. They have been deprived of the sense that there is something else in life, some purpose that has come with them into the world."

1. Who Am I?

Hi, I'm Dave Norton, pastor of the Lima Presbyterian Church.

2. Why Might You Be Interested in LPC?

Many people are emotionally itchy, vaguely dissatisfied, looking for more substance in life, but not quite sure what that might be. These could all be symptoms of a kind of spiritual emptiness. LPC is in the business of helping people fill their spirits.

3. What Is LPC's Approach?

Our church is humble before God; we don't believe we have all the spiritual answers. At the same time we are grounded enough to have confidence we are asking many of the right questions. We are more into thoughtful exploration than rigid dogma.

4. What Do We do?

We have Sunday worship for adults, church school for children, book clubs, Bible study and service projects of many kinds. All these are expressions of the love we have for God, for one another and for our community. (Here you might add a personal outcome of your participation.)

5. Call for Action

Would you like to try us out? I'd be happy to pick you up at 10:15. Bring (name).

That's it - 12 or 13 sentences. Want to have fun with a speech that is even shorter and punchier? Play with this one:

Lima Presbyterian Church, we're quite possibly better than nothing. Try us and see for yourself. (Nothing is the most common alternative to church.)

Whether or not your particular speech draws in a lot of new people, the experience of making it will help focus your faith and witness. And that in itself is a valuable benefit.

Oh, there is one more thing, please introduce me to those you bring.

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Organ Project

As I write this report we have had a successful workday that saw the installation of the largest (and heaviest!) single piece into our organ. This is only the latest in a series of milestones that we have achieved over the last few months. As I reviewed my last newsletter update from June, it has been remarkable to see the progress that we have made towards completion of the organ.

Since June we have set up the organ structure and begun to install components in it. We have constructed the new choir risers, which the choir has begun to use this fall. When the organ set-up is more complete at the end of November, the hardwood will be installed on the floor, and the pews will be re-installed in the choir loft. Work has also been taking place in the blower room in the tower. The organ blower is being re-assembled, and the other components are being installed in the room. Much of the outside work is complete. The windchests have been delivered from Parsons, and the structure built in John Bailey's shop has been completed and mostly installed. The casework has been stripped, and will soon be returned to John Bailey for refinishing.

While all of these large and obvious changes are happening, less obvious work is also underway. This includes finishing of many components with shellac or polyurethane, and wiring many of the windchests. We are also applying gaskets to many of the winding components. As we complete the installation of the large components later this year, more of these smaller projects will need to be done.

There are many ways in which you can help complete this project. First, please pray for the work days, for safety, wisdom and fellowship. Come join us for a workday; you might just enjoy yourself, learn something the project, and learn something about your fellow church members. Many different people have helped with this project, but we always welcome additional hands. It has been a real blessing to share these times with one another, and to get to know one another. The support that has been received for this project is much appreciated. We look forward to the sounds that we will hear, and we can say that we made that possible together.

Organ workdays are every Saturday (except for November 3rd) from 8:30 to 1:00. Everyone is welcome!
